



2024 GENERAL APPLICATION INFORMATION AND INSTRUCTIONS





Overview:

Enrollment in the Occupational Therapy Doctorate (OTD) program is limited each year to 30 students. Application scores include the following factors:

- Academic status prerequisite and overall GPAs
- Application essay
- Three pre-professional evaluations and recommendations
- Volunteer and Leadership Roles

To be considered for the OTD program, applicants must apply to **BOTH** the Arkansas State University (AState) graduate school and the OTD program. Admission into the graduate school does not guarantee admission into the OTD program. We prefer applicants to apply to the graduate school before you submit your program application in February. If you do not have a Bachelor's degree, please include your most current transcript through the Fall semester before your application in the Spring semester.

The Occupational Therapy Doctorate program consists of 9 semesters totaling 120 credit hours. Upon graduation from the OTD program, students must take the required National Board exam hosted by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT) to practice occupational therapy. Students are strongly encouraged to take the NBCOT board exam within six months after graduation.

The National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT) requires all graduates to pass a background check prior to taking the NBCOT board exam. Failure to pass the NBCOT background check prohibits the licensed practice of occupational therapy.

Upon passing the NBCOT examination, the student will become a registered Occupational Therapist (OTR) and then may apply for state licensure. All 50 states have regulatory laws for occupational





therapists and require licensure. Frequently these state requirements are met through the same education and training required to maintain certification with NBCOT.

Program expectations: Matriculation

The OTD program is a lock-step program. Students must maintain satisfactory grades in each semester; otherwise the student can be placed on probation or dismissed from the program. The OTD Program requires timely completion of the all degree requirements, including all didactic coursework, Level II Fieldwork rotations, OTKE exam for third-year entry and Capstone. To progress in the professional curriculum, students must:

- 1. Maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA in all Occupational Therapy Program courses,
- 2. Receive grades of 75% or better in all professional courses,
- 3. Maintain academic integrity and professional behavior in classroom, laboratory, any fieldwork sites visited, and in the community,
- 4. Maintain the standards of affiliating fieldwork facilities, and
- 5. Exhibit affective behaviors consistent with the Professional Behavior Expectations and AOTA Code of Ethics.

Fieldwork Requirements

Level 1

The curriculum includes three (3) Level I fieldworks, allowing the student to acquire 40 hours of clinical experience in each of the following areas: pediatrics, psychosocial and aging adults. The Level 1 fieldworks support students' integration of learned information to applied clinical contexts. Fieldwork assignments are designed to foster students in developing clinical reasoning skills and to develop knowledge about the principles of occupation. Level I experiences are integral to the curriculum design and include direct observation and participation in selected aspects of care. Level I experiences may relate to occupational therapy service delivery, or they may be under the supervision of related professionals in emerging practice areas.

Level II

The curriculum also includes two (2) Level II fieldworks each 12 weeks in length. Students are at fieldwork sites full-time during Level II experiences. Level II Fieldwork is designed to facilitate the student's personal and professional development. The integration and application of clinical reasoning and practical skills will be required in both of the Level II experiences, during which students will provide occupational therapy services to a range of individuals. The fieldwork experiences are provided at approved facilities with supervision to meet professional accreditations standards. Students are responsible for all aspects of the occupational therapy process during the Level II experiences.

Students are responsible for all fieldwork expenses.





The student must successfully complete all coursework and Level II fieldwork and pass a pre-NBCOT competency practice examination requirement prior to the commencement of the doctoral experiential component.

Capstone

The third-level of fieldwork is called Capstone and affords students with a final learning experience in clinical practice, research, theory, leadership, program development, policy development, advocacy or education. Capstone is a minimum of 14-weeks or 560 hours and must occur under the supervision of a mentor with expertise in the area of the Capstone. Prior fieldwork or work experience may not be substituted for Capstone. Capstone may not occur at a student' place of employment. Capstone is student driven and provides the opportunity to apply didactic knowledge, leadership and advocacy skills in an area of interest. Students participate in two capstone preparation courses to develop their capstone project. The semester leading up to the Capstone rotation focuses on above-generalist content in order to round out the student skills for the capstone experience.

**Students are responsible for all fieldwork and Capstone expenses.

Program completion and Graduation

To graduate from the program, students must achieve a final grade of 75% or higher on all didactic courses, have a 3.0 overall GPA and pass all three fieldwork levels in the curriculum.

Students have up to 24 months after completion of the didactic coursework to complete both Level II Fieldwork rotations and Capstone experience. Timely completion of the program is monitored by the student and his/her faculty advisor using the OTD Program Graduation Check Sheet.

Certification and Licensure

NBCOT Certification Exam Procedures

Graduates of our program are eligible to sit for the National Certification Examination for Occupational Therapy, administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). After successful completion of the exam, the individual will be a registered Occupational Therapist (OTR). To be eligible to take the NBCOT certification exam, "OTR candidates must graduate with an entry-level occupational therapy degree from an ACOTE®-accredited occupational therapy (OT) program." (https://www.nbcot.org/Students/get-certified#eligibility)

NBCOT® Academic Credential Verification Policy U.S. graduates examining for the first time must submit an official final transcript from the university that confirms eligibility for admission to the examination.





Licensure in the State of Arkansas

In addition, all states require licensure in order to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination. The Arkansas State University OTD Program school code is 30508.

Felony Conviction Statement

**A felony conviction may affect a graduate's ability to sit for the NBCOT certification examination or attain state licensure.

Admission requirements:

In order to be eligible for application to the Occupational Therapy Doctorate program, applicants must meet the following minimal requirements:

- Within 1 semester of completing a or an earned Baccalaureate degree from an accredited University or College if you do not have a Bachelor's degree.
- Application to AState graduate school
- All transcripts submitted to the AState graduate school
- Program prerequisites with a minimum grade of "B" required in all courses. Applicants must have a minimum of 20 prerequisite credit hours completed at the time of application on February 1.
- A prerequisite GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale
- A cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher on a 4.0 scale of all college work attempted
- 30 hours of documented community service. 20 hours must be in a single location.
- 3 pre-professional recommendations (must use admission packet forms)
- English proficiency requirements, if foreign born (see application p. 6)
- Applicants scoring 70 or higher on the admission application will receive automatic consideration by the admissions committee.
- Scores between 65 and 70 will be reviewed on a case by case basis for admission.
- Scores below 65 will not be considered for admission.
- Any incomplete application will not be considered for admission.





Prerequisite courses:

If you are applying from another university, contact the OTD program director to make sure your prerequisite courses are acceptable. Bonus courses: Applicants that have completed courses listed at level 3000 or higher with a grade of A or B can earn up to 5 points. Bonus courses can be in any academic discipline except for athletic courses.





Application scoring: The maximum score for any applicant is 100 points. A minimum score of 65 is required for consideration in the program.

A. Academic status: The maximum points for academic status is 65. Prerequisite and overall GPA's that fall below 3.0 are not accepted.

- **B.** Application essay: The maximum points for the application essay is 15.
 - 0 =Does not meet criteria

- **C. Community Service and leadership roles:** The maximum points for community service and leadership roles are 10.
 - a. Community Service (5 points) applicant must provide evidence of community service (unpaid) work at a community, university or college, school, or other organization. The evidence must include:
 - i. Letter, on agency letterhead, from the applicant' supervisor verifying the date, purpose, and number of the community service hours.
 - ii. A one-page summary that includes:
 - 1. A description of the volunteer experience
 - 2. The role and associated activities attended to by the applicant
 - 3. The mission of the entity served
 - 4. Self-reflection of the volunteer experience
 - b. Leadership (5 points) applicant must provide evidence of participation in a leadership role at a community, university or college, or other organization. Examples of a leadership role include, but are not limited to, President, Vice-president, Secretary, or Treasurer of an organization. The evidence must include:
 - i. Letter from the applicant' supervisor, on agency letterhead, verifying the date and role of the leadership position.
 - ii. A one-page summary that includes:
 - 1. A description of the leadership experience
 - 2. The role and associated activities attended to by the applicant
 - 3. The mission of the entity served
 - 4. Self-reflection of the leadership experience





D. Pre-professional recommendations: The maximum points for the pre-professional recommendations are 10. The Pre-professional rater must return the evaluation form in a sealed envelope with the rater's signature across seal.

Final application score and ranking:

An applicant' total score is calculated by summing $A + B + C + D = \underline{\hspace{1cm}} /100$. The admission committee ranks the applicants in numerical order highest to lowest. The top 30 applicants receive a position in the program. Remaining eligible applicants are ranked from 31 onward and placed on a waiting list. If a top 30 applicant declines, the admissions committee offers the position to the next applicant on the waiting list. The waiting list remains open until the first day of the fall semester. All remaining applicants are notified that they are declined a position in the program.

Spanish proficiency. Spanish proficiency is not required for application but may enhance the applicant's overall score. Students must prove their proficiency by taking the ACTFL – OPI (Oral Proficiency Interview). Students applying to the AState OTD program from non-AState undergraduate programs:

Pre-requisite courses are offered in the undergraduate program at Arkansas State University. The AState OTD program does not preferentially admit students with a baccalaureate degree from AState and/or prerequisite coursework from AState.

To be considered for the AState OTD program, an applicant must complete a baccalaureate degree from an accredited school recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and a regional accrediting body. Prerequisite coursework must also be completed from an accredited school recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and a regional accrediting body. If an applicant takes the AState OTD prerequisites at another school, then the admissions committee may request a copy of the course syllabus to assure that the course covers the same content as the Arkansas State University prerequisite courses.

To assure that prerequisites will meet the AState OTD program requirements, applicants may request course reviews from the OTD program director/Department Chair prior to submitting an application.

Pre-requisite requirements from an accredited university other than AState:

- Minimum of 3 credit hours and a grade of B or higher in an undergraduate (1000 level or above) Medical Terminology course. If your university only has 1 credit hour courses, you must take 3 courses.
- Minimum of 3 credit hours and a grade of B or higher in an undergraduate (2000 level) or above Statistics course. If the course is not at the 2000 level or at least 3 credits, the applicant must seek permission from the Department Chair to accept course.
- Minimum of 3 credit hours and a grade of B or higher in a (2000) level or above Physics course. If the course is not at the 2000 level or at least 3 credits, the applicant must seek permission from the Department Chair to accept course.
- Minimum of a 2000 level and a grade of B or higher in a 2000 level or above Anatomy I and II course with lab (note: prerequisite hours are 8 credit hours based off of the AState undergraduate Anatomy I and II course, however other universities may not have the same course series, therefore content knowledge demonstrated through participation in an Anatomy I and II course versus a minimum of 8 credit hours is acceptable).
- Minimum of 3 credit hours with a grade of B or higher in a 2000 level or above for Developmental Psychology coursework. If the course is not at the 2000 level or at least 3 credits, the applicant must seek permission from the Department Chair to accept course.
- Minimum of 3 credit hours with a grade of B or higher in a 2000 level or above for Abnormal Psychology coursework. If the course is not at the 2000 level or at least 3 credits, the applicant must seek permission from the Department Chair to accept course.
- Minimum of 3 credit hours with a grade of B or higher in a 1000 level or above Introduction to (General) Psychology coursework. If the course is not at least 3 credits, the applicant must seek permission from the Department Chair to accept course.





English proficiency requirements:

The Department of Occupational Therapy requires a high level of proficiency in English so that all students will be able to fully meet academic and clinical objectives as well as meet criteria for professional licensure. All *foreign-born students must take one of the following tests:

- 1. Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) with a score of 83 on the preferred internet-based test (iBT), 570 on the paper-based test, or 213 on the computer-based test.
- 2. International English Language Testing System (IELTS) with a score of at least 6.5 and a spoken band score of 7.
- 3. Pearson Test of English Academic (PTE) with a score of 56.

The TOEFL is available at the A-STATE Testing Center. When taking the exam off campus, the report code for Arkansas State University is 6011.

Advanced placement:

The admissions process for the Occupational Therapy Doctoral Program requires letter grades to determine overall and prerequisite GPA's, therefore, AP exam scores will be calculated in the following manner: Exam scores of 3 or above are three credits at a grade level of B.

Credit for experiential learning or work experience:

Experiential learning and prior work experience are not accepted as substitutes for academic requirements.

Transfer students:

Transfer students will be considered on a case-by-case basis. Students that are currently enrolled in another accredited OTD program may apply to the AState OTD program using the regular admissions process. Should a transfer student be admitted to the AState OTD program, up to nine graduate credit hours may be used to satisfy degree requirements of the OTD. The OT department admissions committee reviews syllabi from previous OT program and determines which courses meet AState OTD standards. The OT department admissions committee and AState graduate school determine if a student may transfer.

- 3. Submit all transcripts and immunization records to the graduate school. DO NOT send transcripts and immunization records to the Occupational Therapy department or submit transcripts and immunization records with the Occupational Therapy application.

Application instructions: Use the following guidelines when preparing your application packet for the Occupational Therapy Doctorate Program. Read and follow the directions carefully as incomplete applications will not be considered for admission to the program.

- Use a one-inch 3 ring binder. A white binder is preferred but the binder can be in any solid color other than red. (The OTA application binders are red). Your name must be affixed to the outside panel edge (binding) of the binder. The inside contents will begin with a FACE SHEET and APPLICATION PACKET CHECKLIST followed by five (5) dividers ordered and labeled according to the guidelines below.
- FACE SHEET: The first page will be a FACE SHEET. Copy the FACE SHEET found in this packet. Fill it out completely and place it first in the binder. You can type or neatly handwrite the information.
- APPLICATION PACKET CHECKLIST: The second page will be the APPLICATION
 PACKET CHECKLIST. Copy the CHECKLIST found in this packet. Use it to make sure you
 have included everything you need in the packet. The items on the checklist are in the order of
 how the packet should be organized.

DIVIDER 2 – PREREQUISITES AND BONUS COURSES. Complete the prerequisite form and include in this section. Put the grade next to the course(s) you have already completed and include the institution where you completed the course. If you need additional prerequisites, indicate when and where you will be taking the remaining courses. If you have retaken a course, indicate the date of the first course, the grade, and each subsequent attempt and grade thereafter. Complete the bonus course form to earn up to an additional five points on your total admission score.

DIVIDER 3 – APPLICATIONESSAY. The essay must be typed, double-spaced and in 12-pt. font. No more than TWO pages for the essay. The applicant must answer the following questions:

- 1. Occupational therapy is a complex and sometimes misunderstood profession. In your own words, define and describe Occupational Therapy. Describe your reasons for choosing this profession. Describe any experiences you have had with Occupational Therapy.
- 2. Graduate school, especially a doctoral program, requires a lot of time, energy, and sacrifice. Discuss your plan on how you intend to be successful in the program. Provide details.
- 3. Describe why you think you will be a contributing professional to the profession of occupational therapy. Describe past experiences that reflect your personal and professional attributes. Describe past experiences about personal development and leadership.

DIVIDER 4 - COMMUNITY SERVICE AND LEADERSHIP.

Community Service

- List the 20 hours of community service.
- Type a one-page summary from the place you completed 20 hours that includes:
 - A description of the community service experience
 - The role and associated activities attended to by the applicant
 - The mission of the entity served
 - Self-reflection of the community service experience
- Letter from the applicant' supervisor at the agency verifying the date, purpose, and number of community service hours.

Leadership

- List all past and present leadership experiences; list the most recent first
- Choose **one** (1) leadership experience and type a one-page summary that includes:
 - A description of the leadership experience
 - The role and associated activities attended to by the applicant
 - The mission of the entity served
 - Self-reflection of the volunteer experience
- Letter from the applicant' supervisor at the agency verifying the date and role of the leadership position.





DIVIDER 5 – PRE-PROFESSIONAL REFERENCES.

- Arrange for three people to complete your **pre-professional reference forms** (Included in this packet. See p. 23 25). The individuals should know you through a professional relationship and preferably over time. Appropriate reference sources include a work supervisor, a work colleague, faculty member, or clinical supervisors. A family member, relative or close friend cannot provide a reference. References must be submitted in sealed envelopes with evaluator' signature across the seal on the back of the envelope. Put the envelopes in a page protector with a piece of tape over the top, so they do not slide out.
- Complete the **Reference Waiver Form** (included in packet).
- YOU SHOULD SUBMIT NO MORE AND NO LESS THAN THREE (3) REFERENCES IN THE PACKET.

SUMMARY

Submit all of the above materials together in one notebook in the order listed. Information arriving separately from the application packet is not accepted. The admissions committee only evaluates complete applications submitted on or before February 1. No exceptions. The applicant is solely responsible for reading and following all instructions.

ADDITIONAL IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Based on recent legislation in Arkansas, students are required to complete a background check AFTER they receive conditional admission into the program. Arkansas State University's College of Nursing and Health Professions works with Verified Credentials, Inc. to establish an acceptable screening procedure. The cost of the background check is \$100.

The Occupational Therapy Doctorate Program requires all OTD students carry personal health insurance. Students must provide hard copy proof of health insurance to the department Chair after acceptance into the program. Students must provide proof of health insurance by mail, fax or hand delivery no later than August 1 every year in the program. Clear copies of both sides of insurance card will suffice as proof.

AState OTD students are required to carry a minimum of \$1,000,000 (one million) of liability insurance the entire time they are in the program. Student liability insurance cost varies but typically does not exceed \$90 per year.
