Assessment is an important part of what we do in education. Dr. Steve Green, Professor of Soil and Water Conservation, was recognized in October for his outstanding assessment achievements and was named professor of the month by newly formed Assessment office. Dr. Green, was acknowledged for helping his students retain knowledge that is key to career success. In a crucial upper-division agriculture course, Green discovered how he could better achieve his goal of imparting critical field skills to future producers and farm managers.

Two of our student organizations, Collegiate FFA (CFFA) and Alpha Tau Alpha (ATA), partnered together last fall to attend their national conventions which were held at the same time in Louisville, Kentucky. The Collegiate FFA is a national Agricultural Education organization committed to developing student leadership and career success. Alpha Tau Alpha is a national professional Agricultural Education Honor Society.

Dustin Headstream, treasurer of CFFA, president of ATA, and second national vice president of ATA, chaired a committee to help raise funds for convention expenses. The student organizations received support from Craighead Farm Bureau, Ag Watch Network, Armor Seed, and Farm Credit Mid-South. The group (consisting of seven students and one faculty member, Dr. David Agnew) left Jonesboro on October 27, stayed overnight in Elizabethtown, and arrived at Louisville, Kentucky on the 28th. Dr. David Agnew and Dustin Headstream coordinated two national competitions while at the conventions: the ATA Parliamentary Procedure Contest and the Program of Excellence Award. Our students also helped with facilitating the discussion meet and quiz bowl.

Devore Endowment Will Benefit Agriculture Students for years to come

A Prairie County brother and sister have made a gift to Arkansas State University that will benefit future generations of Prairie County students who wish to pursue a degree in agriculture. Bruce Devore and his sister, Daphna Gwin, of Prairie County, Arkansas, transferred their jointly held Walmart stock to the ASU Foundation to establish an endowed scholarship in the College of Agriculture and Technology.

Additionally, Devore has executed a living trust planned gift to A-State that will add additional funds into the endowment upon his death. Following his retirement earlier this year, he started to think about his legacy. Because he has no children, Mr. Devore knew he would keep the farm in the family by selling it to his cousin. Since another cousin, Dr. Bert Greenwalt, teaches at A-State, Devore decided to make a legacy gift to the university that will benefit students from his home county.

"I didn't get a college education," he said. "But I think students coming from where I did should be able to if they want to." Once he set up the legacy gift, Devore said he started thinking about how long it might be before the endowment would be used. It was then that he and his sister decided to liquidate their Walmart stock, gift it to A-State, and name the endowment in honor of their father (Earl) and Bruce.

Dr. Timothy N. Burcham, dean of the A-State College of Agriculture and Technology, said the Earl and Bruce Devore Endowed Scholarship will be made available in 2019 to students from Prairie County who intend to pursue an agriculture degree at Arkansas State University. Students from the county who have attended the university's sister campus in Beebe and want to further their education at A-State will also qualify.

"We appreciate this generous gift," said Burcham. "Mr. Devore's vision will benefit generations of students who have a desire to improve their lives and the lives of others, through educational achievement."

Wilson Family Endows Faculty Agribusiness Chair at Arkansas State

Last summer Perry Wilson, great-great grandson of R.E. Lee Wilson of Mississippi County, announced that his family will endow a faculty chair in Agricultural Business with a \$1 million gift to Arkansas State University. "It is very, very important to my family that Arkansas State carries on the tradition it has had in educating folks to go into agriculture and into business," Wilson said. "That's the real purpose of the endowment; to be a crossover between the agriculture school and the business school."

Wilson said a lot of people come into farming well educated in agriculture but lack the business training they need, for instance, to market their crops. Because Arkansas State is, what he said, "smack in the middle of the Delta," the university finds itself uniquely situated to address that concern.

"Perry Wilson and his family have been a part of Arkansas State for nearly a century; their leadership and philanthropy have contributed to the very fabric of our university," said Dr. Tim Hudson, A-State chancellor. "This generous gift to create an endowed chair further extends the Wilson family's legacy. The position it supports will allow our agricultural business program to lead the way for generations to come."

According to Dr. Timothy Burcham, agriculture dean, the endowed faculty chair in agricultural business will ensure academic distinction at A-State by attracting a faculty member who exhibits the highest degree of excellence in agri-business. "When you look at having an endowed faculty chair, that sets you at a whole other level with regard to the type of individual you're recruiting," said. "This is a tremendous program and concentration that will allow us to do a great job with our students."

Wilson said the legacy of his family is what brought him to A-State, but seeing how the university has advanced since he has been involved has been "thrilling."

Planning coursework and selecting the chair holder will take time, Burcham said. The university hopes to have a curriculum in place for the fall 2017 semester.
