■ TO PREPARE FOR A FUTURE AT CNHP

You must become familiar with the field of study in which you are interested. Contact the department or program of your choice for specific information and ask how best to prepare yourself for admission (about prerequisites, admission requirements, deadlines, health records, immunization requirements and so forth).

ADMISSION TO UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

Students must first be admitted to Arkansas State University through the Office of Admissions. Phone: (870) 972-3024 or 1-800-382-3030 if you are calling from out of town.

Admission to Arkansas State University does not guarantee admission to the programs in the College of Nursing and Health Professions. Check with the program of your choice for detailed admission requirements and deadlines (which may vary each year).

ACCREDITATION AND REGISTRATION

The associate, baccalaureate and master's degree programs in nursing are approved by the Arkansas State Board of Nursing and accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). The Nurse Anesthesia program is accredited by the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Education Programs. Upon completion of either of the undergraduate nursing programs the graduate, upon the Board of Nursing approval, is eligible to take the National Council of State Boards of Nursing Licensing Examination (NCLEX) and, after passing the examination, to be licensed as a Registered Nurse by the state(s) to which application was made.

The Clinical Laboratory Science programs are accredited by the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS). Graduates of these programs are eligible to write the national certifying examinations in their specialty through the American Society of Clinical Pathologists or other appropriate agency.

Communication Disorders is accredited by the Council on Academic Accreditation in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology. Graduates are eligible to take the Specialty Area Exam in Speech-Language Pathology (part of the Praxis Series Exam) administered by ETS (Education Testing Service). Graduate students must complete the exam, and have official results reported to CD prior to graduation with the Master's Degree.

The Physical Therapy and Physical Therapist Assistant programs are accredited by the Commission on Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education of the American Physical Therapy Association. Graduates are eligible to take the licensing examination administered by the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy.

The Radiologic Technology and Radiation Therapy programs are accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology (JRCERT). Graduates are eligible to write the national certifying examination of the American Registry of Radiologic Technologists (ARRT).

The Diagnostic Medical Sonography Program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Programs (CAAHEP). Graduates are able to write the national certifying exams in abdomen, obstetrics and vascular technology offered by the Society of Diagnostic Medical Sonography (SDMS).

Social Work is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. Graduates are eligible to sit for the Licensed Social Worker exam given by the State of Arkansas Social Work Licensing Board. The State Board defines what social work is and delineates the practice in the profession. The exam is the same exam given nationwide in the field of Social Work.

The Coordinated Program in Dietetics has been granted candidate status by the Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. Graduates of the program are eligible to sit for the national credentialing examination and apply for state licensure.

Accreditation for Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management degrees is not required or universal. However, the DPEM is seeking accreditation through the Foundation for Higher Education Accreditation. This organization is seeking to be recognized by the Department of Education as the official accreditor for such programs.

The Occupational Therapy Assistant and Occupational Therapy Doctorate programs have applied for accreditation by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE). ACOTE is recognized as the accrediting agency for occupational therapy education by both the United States Department of Education (USDE) and the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA).

Most state and national board application forms ask if the applicant has ever been convicted of a crime. Certain crimes (e.g. controlled substance use or sale) may make the applicant ineligible to write the examination. If a student has any reason to believe that she/he may be ineligible to write state or national board examinations, she/he should discuss this with the department chair or program director.



BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN NURSING (BSN).

The nurse prepared at the baccalaureate level is a professional who has acquired a well delineated and broad knowledge base for practice. This knowledge base prepares the beginning graduate to function as a provider of direct and indirect care to individuals, families, groups, communities and populations. Arkansas State has also developed a variety of approaches for admission with advanced standing for LPNs and RNs. The RN to BSN option is available online as well as the support courses.

Graduates of both the AASN and BSN programs upon the Board of Nursing approval are eligible to sit for the national licensure examination (NCLEX) to become a registered Nurse (RN).

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN NURSING (MSN).

The MSN prepares nurses with the complex practice skills and theoretical knowledge necessary for advanced nursing practice in the contemporary health care system. Graduate study in nursing is the basis for professional growth in advanced practice roles and the foundation for doctoral study in nursing. Areas of study for MSN are adult health clinical nurse specialist, nurse educator, nurse administrator, family nurse practitioner and nurse anesthesia. THE DOCTOR OF NURSING PRACTICE (DNP).

The DNP program is offered as a post-master's Nursing degree for Advanced Practice Nurses. The DNP curricula builds on traditional master's programs with education in evidenced-based practice, advanced clinical, organizational, economic, and leadership skills to design and implement programs of care delivery which significantly impact health care outcomes and have the potential to transform health care delivery.
