New science

As Logan Jones peers through the microscope he seems captivated by the slide which shows a gold fish cell.

The South Mississippi County at Wilson fifth grader raises his head and announces, "If scientists get to do this, then I might just become a scientist."

Although Jones still has his whole academic career in front of him, it's the type of response the Arkansas State University GK12 program is trying to elicit from middle school students.

The GK12 program was instituted by the National Science Foundation after research showed science scores peaked for students in the fifth grade, then declined over the next three years. It's two-fold purpose is to not only peak middle school students' interest in science, but utilize graduate or doctorate students to do so.

ASU has signed on for five years of the federallyfunded program and has placed eight Fellows in five school districts across east Arkansas.

Included along with South Mississippi County are Helena-West Helena, Armorel, Cross County and Nettleton.

Shea Harris, pursuing his master's degree in environmental science, spends alternating Fridays at two campuses in the local district either with Patti Misner or Anna Burton's classes at Wilson and Luxora, respec-

"Scientists are stereotyped as old, bald-headed guys, in a white lab coat," said Harris, smiling as he described the scientist he envisioned, "and that tends to give students a false impression of the field. We want to open up the exciting world of science and maybe, just maybe, some of the students will pursue careers in the science field."

Judging by the students' reaction as Harris explains the parts of a microscope, before allowing them to view numerous microscopic slides, he seems to have captured their attention. They take turns viewing slides of everything from ditch water to snake blood as Harris incorporates a lesson on plant and animal cells.

As he discusses plant cells, Harris seems to be touching on his own research which is also an element of the program.

Harris' research is in the field of Phytoremediation using plants to clean polluted sites — and another goal of the program is to improve the Fellows' communication skills so a lay audience can have an under-

Misner and Burton became involved after submitting requests to be included in the program and the measure of its success will be found in the students' benchmark scores.

"We're only in the second week here," Misner said. "So it's still too early to see if it's having an impact. But were committed to making this work."
