Beck Center for Veterans

After more than 10 years of service, it was time to evaluate services offered and what changes are needed to continue to be productive in meeting the needs of military veterans in Northeast Arkansas. The name of the center needed to be more direct in identifying the population that is served. The Beck Vet Center Advisory Board approved the following name change to the Beck Center for Veterans. Other changes are forthcoming to improve our services to veterans and strengthen our ties with Arkansas State University programs.

Upcoming programs include a Guitar for Veterans group with support from Dr. Timothy Crist. Guitars have been purchased and delivered. The program will start in January. Hippotherapy and equine assisted psychotherapy (EAT) for veterans has started this fall and will continue through the spring semester. Farley Schweighart PT, Cert. DN. is the lead instructor for physical therapy, Andrea Brown, OT/L for occupational therapy and Lynda Nash, LCSW for psychotherapy.

The service dog training program, Paws for Vets, will be starting a new class for veterans and their dogs in January, 2020. Support from the community has provided the funding for this class, including private donations and a fundraiser from Newks and Shadrack's Coffee.

SPECIAL OLYMPICS 2019

Arkansas State University College of Nursing and Health Professions, New York Institute of Technology Doctor of Osteopathy prorgam and University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences teamed up to sponsor Jonesboro MedFest 2019: Special Olympics Athletic Physicals. The event took place Friday, Nov. 15, on the Arkansas State University campus within the Student Health Center, and was headed by Theresa Book, Special Olympics Field Representative of NEA/Area 7, Dr. Leonie DeClerk DNP, APRN, FNP-BC of UAMS Little Rock, and LAUREN HANCOCK MSN. FNP-BC assistant professor within Arkansas State University's College of Nursing and Health Professions/Family Nurse Practitioner Program.

Alongside licensed/board-certified family nurse practitioners, 60 A-State student volunteers gave of their time and skill set in order for 48 of our community's school-age Special Olympic athletes to be successfully screened prior to participating in the upcoming activity season. TITLE IV-E ARKANSAS ACADEMIC PARTNERSHIP IN PUBLIC CHILD WELFARE

This has been a year of dramatic changes in services to maltreated children in Arkansas. The Arkansas Legislature and Governor Hutchinson have provided unprecedented financial and program restructuring support to the Division of Children and Family Services (DCFS). The primary changes have been additional staff across the state, allowing most counties to achieve the national goal of no more than 15-20 cases per worker. Secondly, the salaries have increased to compete in the job market. Supportive programs, such as Nurturing Families of Arkansas, have provided direct parenting education to families as well as being developmentally appropriate for each child. It has long been identified that the supervisor line is one of the most critical in best practice service delivery in child protective services. The legislature approved the addition of multiple supervisors around the state in order to lower the supervisor to worker assignments thus allowing for more frequent and higher quality supervision, mentoring, training and monitoring.

There was a total of 2,536 separate field training events delivered by the A-State IV-E staff. The table shows the breakdown of events by activity type from Jan. 1-June 30. A-State IV-E also sponsored the DCFS Staff Education Day, the Northeast Arkansas Foster Parent Conference, and the Spring Social Work Conference. Karen Fullen oversaw the adjuncts for the Child Welfare, Exploring Child Abuse and Neglect and the Children and the Law courses. The IV-E team presented 10 trainings over a ten month period. In addition, they also presented on Critical Thinking in Assessments, Trauma Informed Care and Difficult Encounters.

Retirement: Trish Holt retired from the grant after 18 years of service. New Staff: Natalie Gatlin started after a two year absence, during which time she worked as a county supervisor for DCFS.

Conferences: Three IV-E staff attended the state "Child Abuse and Prevention Conference". Brooke Carr attended "Children in the Courts".

New Program Development

Julie King, Ph.D., CSP has been hired to develop a BS degree in Occupational and Environmental Safety and Health. Julie was most recently a Chemical Safety Specialist at Rice University. She has a BS in Chemistry with a minor in Biology, MS in Environmental Sciences and a Ph.D. in Inorganic Chemistry.

The degree program would provide baseline education for the assessment and enforcement of standards governing the safety of air, water, food, sewage, noise, radiation, hazardous waste and other materials. Graduates would be actively involved in the overall environmental quality within a community and the prevention of diseases associated with environmental and other related factors. Individuals conduct health hazard evaluations and recommend controls to minimize the health risks to workers in the occupational environment. They can also assess risk in the workplace, concentrating on acute hazards that could result in immediate injury or death. These individuals are employed by a diverse array of industries including hospitals, private industry, government organizations, academic institutions and military installations. The program will vie for accreditation through the National Environmental Health Science and Protection Accreditation Council. The program development and approval process should be completed over the next year.

Nursing and Health Professions to add Adult Gerontology Acute Care Option

It is with great excitement Arkansas State University College of Nursing & Health Professions would like to announce the planned addition of the Adult Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner option to our graduate programs. This program will prepare students with complex theoretical and practical skills needed to become expert clinicians. The Adult Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner option will be offered in the Masters of Science in Nursing program for the baccalaureate prepared nurse. There are also plans to offer a post master's certificate for current practitioners seeking an additional specialty. Due to the rapidly changing healthcare environment and increased complexity of patient needs our graduates will be able to fill current voids in a variety of health care settings across the region as well as on a state and national level.

DELTA CARE-A-VAN



The Delta Care-a-Van is a project involving mobile interprofessional preventive care services such as diabetes, obesity, immunizations, prenatal, and mental health care. The Care-a-Van has traveled to several northeast Arkansas rural communities delivering preventive care services and health education, without cost to the patient or need for an appointment. Medical students from NYITCOM at A-State as well as A-State nursing and social work students have been involved in the education and care. The van is equipped with two examination rooms and state-of-theart telemedicine technology. Areas the mobile clinic has or is expected to visit include the cities of Harrisburg, Leachville, Lepanto, Manila, Piggott, Walnut Ridge, and Marked Tree, with plans to expand services to other areas of the Delta region. J. Stephen Guffey had his initial appointment to our college in January, 1996-2003 as an assistant professor of physical therapy, and was promoted and tenured during that time. He also served as PT program director for three years . He returned to A-State in 2012 as an associate professor of PT and was promoted to full professor. Stephen earned his BS in Physical Therapy from the University of Central Arkansas, Masters in Exercise Science from the University of Arkansas and his Ed.D. in **Educational Leadership from Arkansas** State University. He began his career in PT practice but began teaching in 1987 at the University of Central Arkansas with a teaching stint at Texas Tech University as well. He continued his clinical practice during the summers as well as traveled to teach continuing education modules.

While at the college, he was awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award, probably more than once. Students describe his teaching as amazing, passionate, with exceptional knowledge in his content areas yet a challenging instructor. They credit him for one of the best learning experiences of their lifetime - a master teacher and one who was committed to student learning. He receives notes from graduates regularly who thank him for making them really learn the material, problem solve and critically think - they usually convey a situation that they have "solved" that current treatment was not impacting and want him to feel proud of their achievements. In teaching, it is not easy to know if you are reaching students until you get these kind of letters. What Stephen will note, "What we do matters even if it is hard to tell sometimes."

Stephen was also awarded the College Excellence in Scholarship award at least twice. He was a prolific writer and a very productive researcher with many projects occurring concurrently which included

interdisciplinary teams of students and faculty. He is a noted author in visible light research. Stephen received a note recently from "a stranger" who conveyed her thanks to him for his research.

She said that using some of his findings have allowed her to be without symptoms which interfered greatly with her sleep. The beginning of her note said, "On this Thanksgiving morning, one of the things I'm thankful for this year is that I recently stumbled on your research paper, "Using near infrared light to manage symptoms associated with restless leg syndrome." Researchers often wonder if their work is making a difference. As Stephen noted, "It matters to some folks. Students should know this."

Guffey had many accomplishments in service as well - to the community, university and the profession. He is good at everything he sets out to do and is consummate professional. He is passionate about his discipline, his students, his research, was a wonderful colleague/role model/mentor and worked in the best interest of the department, college, and A-State. Stephen is very well regarded and respected. He is certainly "one of a kind" - the kind we had for 14 years in our college and will really, really miss.

Since he has come back to us twice in seven-year stints, we can dream that after a "respite" he will return a third time for another seven years. There is always hope. Until then, thank you Dr. Guffey
