The A-State College of Education and Behavioral Science partnered with the Arkansas Department of Education and Govern-



ARTful TEACHING CONFERENCE

Dr. Sue Anselm, the Mountain Home campus director and Sharla Felkins, TE instructor attended the 2019 ARTful Teaching Conference, which brings together professors and pre-service teachers from Arkansas colleges and universities for two days of exploration and learning in the realm of arts integration. The instructors attended with four students from the MLED and ELED program, and the Jonesboro campus brought several students to the conference as well. The conference is held at the Winthrop Rockefeller Institute in Morrilton, and aims to introduce teachers to arts-integration practices (the strategy of teaching subject area content in tandem with visual and performing arts modalities) early on in their careers and to encourage faculty and administrators to make arts integration strategies a basic part of their curriculum. The conference features presentations by arts education specialists from around the country together with workshops led by professors and secondary teachers, honoring a tradition of idea sharing from returning attendees.



Past conferences have focused on the performing arts, dance, the visual arts, music and artistic transformation and adaptation. Featured presenters have included former Arkansas Teachers of the Year, educators from the Teachers College at Columbia University (N.Y.), and the Director of El Sistema Lehigh Valley (Pa.). This year's conference theme was Student Empowerment Through the Arts.


PRESENTATIONS

The poster is based on a current evaluation of a parenting curriculum.



Daniel A. Parker, (left) assessment coordinator, Professional Education Programs, will present "Retrieval Practice as Process in Self-Directed Learning: New Philosophical Directions for Self-Directed Learning" at the Adult Education Research Conference in June in Buffalo, N.Y. His presentation advocates functional contextualism as a research philosophy to synthesize cognitive science and adult self-directed learning research, while exploring use cases for retrieval practice as a learning strategy.





Mid-level Teacher Education major Kylie Brickey presented a scholarly poster and won the best undergraduate poster for the College of Education and Behavioral Science.






