Ed.S. Reading Alum Publishes State Journal Article

Ed.S. Reading (2021) graduate, Ms. Helen Smith of Clarksville, Tennessee, has just published the fourth article by a Graduate Reading program candidate, "Literacy Practices in the Digital Age: Using Fanfiction in the Reading-Writing Curriculum," in the December 2021 edition of the Tennessee Literacy Journal. TLJ is the peer-reviewed journal for the Literacy Association of Tennessee, which is the state-level affiliate for the International Literacy Association (ILA).

Helen developed this manuscript while taking the course RDNG 7542 New Literacies as part of the Ed.S. Reading program. "Getting the article ready for submission was similar to writing a paper for the Ed.S. program at A-State. I followed the directions of my instructors and then decided it wouldn't hurt to send it in and see what happens.," Smith says. "I remembered that all authors revise, and rethink based on their publisher's advice. So, I did more research and revised based on the publisher's advice."

"It never fails to move me when candidates summon the motivation to take this step to submit their work to a journal," says Dr. Ryan Kelly, professor of Reading and professor of the New Literacies course. "It continues to be a somewhat difficult time for publication as many state-level affiliates bounce back into regular cycles of membership and publication, following the pandemic." If all goes well, program candidates identify a state-level journal during the first week of the course and have their paper ready for submission following their last round of feedback at the end of the course. "It's wonderful to see them take that leap and submit—and especially to see their reaction when they hear about acceptance after waiting for peer review to take place."

In addition to the added enrichment of working toward this publication goad, it is also about making an impact in their field, which is a stated program goal. "Seeing my article in print was so exciting," Smith added. "I danced around my living room and cried happy tears of joy. I never thought something like that could happen to me." Helen currently teaches First Grade at Rossview Elementary in Clarksville, Tennessee and is a 22-year veteran in her district. She was also recently named the program award winner for the Ed.S. Reading program at the Convocation of Scholars Honors Banquet for the College of Education and Behavioral Science. "It also makes you want to try again."




Ed.D Alum Founds Institute

Congratulations Keyon! You have represented the College of Education and Behavioral Science and your Advisor Dr. Amy Pearce well.


















































































Sports Management Students at Final Four

Ternes Co-Authors Analysis of NIL Policy

An article co-authored by Dr. Neal Ternes, assistant professor of Sport Management, was published in the fall edition of the Columbia Journal for Law and the Arts. The authors detail how hastily crafted policies covering new rules for athlete name, image and likeness (NIL) policies at colleges and universities may run afoul of First Amendment doctrine. A follow-up article was published in The Conversation.
