

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Arkansas' First Ever NASA In-Flight Educational Downlink

for Arkansas' first ever NASA In-Flight
Educational Downlink, hosted by
Nettleton STEAM School. The event
was coordinated by STEAM Principal
Cathelene Gray and STEAM
Facilitator, Kelli Cochran, in
partnership with A-State, the
Department of Elementary and

Secondary Education (DESE) and

Arkansas PBS.





The downlink was a 20minute conversation with
Expedition 64 astronauts
aboard the International
Space Station. Arkansas
PBS live-streamed the event
through their various digital
platforms, which allowed
students from all over the
state to witness this special
event in real time.

Student Achievements

Graduate Reading Alum Publishes Article in State Journal

MSE Reading (2019) and Ed.S. Reading (2020) alum, Ms. Stephanie Thompson of North Little Rock, has just published an article, "Engage, Motivate, and Enhance Students: Theory, Forms, and Successful Implementation," in the Arkansas English Journal. AEJ is the peer-reviewed journal for the Arkansas Council of Teachers of English and Language Arts (ACTELA), which is the state-level affiliate for the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE).

Stephanie developed this manuscript while taking the course RDNG 7542 New Literacies as part of the Ed.S. Reading program. "Reading and learning about New Literacies helped me to open my eyes to more possibilities in the classroom, especially for my young ELL students," Thompson says. "The more creative that I allow my students [to be], the more they thrive, and New Literacies does that by allowing those students who are shy and not as outspoken a chance to show their understanding in a more creative way."

"Sending a manuscript to a state-level affiliate journal is the ultimate goal of this course," according to Dr. Ryan Kelly, Professor of Reading and professor of the course. "My hope is that our specialist candidates can lay out a solid foundation of theory and then identify a suitable form of classroom practice to bring that theory to life." If all goes well, program candidates identify their target state-level journal early in the course and have their paper ready to submit at the end of the course. "Most students identify more than one possible state-level journal, across a number of states in which our program candidates live."

"I have seen such growth with many of my ELL students because of their abilities to be creative using New Literacies," Thompson added. "All of the courses within the Reading Program helped me to further not only my understanding of the science of reading but also gave me new tools to try and share with my coworkers."

For students in the course, it's not just about the experience and accomplishment of the publication, which is a challenge in itself—but it's also about making an impact in their field. "One challenge about this assignment that I feel many teachers can relate to is how they can use New Literacies and modify it best for their students," Thompson says. "Working with a younger age group, you have to really think outside the box and create fun and exciting ways to keep students engaged. Making a lasting impression is what will stay with students and help them retain the information you are giving."



An article by Dr. Dixie K. Keyes,

(textual and digital materials
derived from published works like
video games or music albums),
then determined how they deepen
user understanding in reading and

In "Setting precedence in education: An examination of culturally responsive teaching self-efficacy beliefs," they studied teacher education candidates' culturally responsive teaching self-efficacy and its potential impact on student engagement, instructional strategies, and classroom management that leads to special education referral.

Wyatt-Salehi co-presented research at Association for Education Finance and Policy Annual Conference



Kirstyn Wyatt-Salehi, A-State Coordinator of Teacher Internships & Ed.D. candidate at University of Arkansas, and colleague Jessica Enderlin Nadzam, Biology Teacher at Jonesboro High School & Ph.D. candidate at Texas Tech University, presented their research entitled, "Arkansas Teachers' Attrition Predicted by Increased Job-Demands and Mediated by Self-Efficacy during the 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic" at the Association for Education Finance & Policy 46th Annual Conference on March 18, 2021. Salehi and Nadzam surveyed Arkansas teachers regarding their jobs-demands before and during the COVID-19 pandemic and compared that data to teacher self-efficacy to see if there was a link between them. Kirstyn was awarded a W.E. Manning scholarship for her doctoral studies at the University of Arkansas. She is studying the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on teacher attrition in Arkansas to lay the groundwork for her dissertation research.
