

Dr. Lucy Barnhouse's co-edited collection of essays with Dr. Winston Black, *Beyond Cadfael: Medieval Medicine and Medical Medievalism*, published in July.

In addition to editing, Dr. Barnhouse co-wrote the introduction and chapter seven, entitled: "Mysteries and Medicines: Medieval Medical Practitioners in Crime Fiction."

Barnhouse also completed the article "Contentious catalysts: beguines, place, and identity in late medieval Mainz" in *Women's History Review*. You can hear about it in the Footnoting History podcast <u>here.</u>





In September, **Dr. Andrea Davis** traveled to <u>Luxembourg's Centre for Digital and</u> <u>Contemporary History</u>. She was awarded a fellowship as a visiting researcher.

As part of the fellowship, Davis presented "Memory and History: Spanish Civil War and Dictatorship" at their conference.

In November, Davis presented "Enabling Access through Collaboration: Memory and History" at a <u>conference</u> at Barcelona's Centre for Dictatorships and Democracies. A-State and UCLA co-hosted the event, of which Davis was part of the organizing committee.

Dr. Davis was also granted tenure in June, becoming Associate Professor of History.





Dr. Edward Salo participated in the National Security Seminar at the <u>US Army</u> <u>War College</u> in June.

This seminar or NSS is the capstone event for the academic year. It is a four-day event that invites guests and students to discuss issues of national security. Salo was nominated by Lt. Col. Christopher Wilson, an A-State alum.

In <u>September</u>, the Modern War Institute announced Salo as a research fellow at Joint Special Ops University to study the weaponization of heritage in irregular warfare "The Joint Special Operations University (JSOU) at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Fla., [also] appointed Salo to serve as a nonresident research fellow."

Dr. Justin Castro presented "Engineer Modesto C. Rolland: His Life and Work in Global Context" at the Mexican Seminar on the History of Construction, hosted by the National Coordinating Office for Historical Monuments and the Mexican National Institute of Anthropology and History.

He also chaired Zane Brown's master thesis.



Drs. Kellie Buford and Ed Salo are writing a chapter that explores the social history of military sites in the Golden Gate National Recreation Area in California.

The National Park Service and the Organization of American Historians chose them to take part in a historical resources survey that "examines the park's resources and how to present them to the public."







The American Association of State Colleges and Universities <u>chose</u> **Dr. Cherisse Jones-Branch,** dean of the Graduate School and professor of history, as one of 29 higher ed professionals to participate in the AASC 2023 Millennium Leadership Initiative.

"The initiative is rooted in preparing higher education leaders from traditionally underrepresented communities with the skills, philosophical overview, and networks necessary to advance to the highest ranks of postsecondary education."

The <u>Women's Foundation of Arkansas</u> also chose Dr. Branch as one of the Top 100 Women of Impact in Arkansas.



Dr. Jason Post was invited by the Association of American Geographers to write an article for their "From the Meridian" section of ESRI ArcNews.

His article: "At What Scale Do Historically Excluded Geographers Become Visible" is about including students from historically marginalized communities.



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Dr. Cristina Urías-Espinoza won the 2023 Gastón García Cantú Award from the Mexican Federal Ministry of Culture through the National Institute of Historical Studies of the Revolutions of Mexico (INEHRM) for best doctoral dissertation.

Her dissertation is titled Land Speculation and American Colonization of Northwest Mexico.

Dr. Urías-Espinoza received her Ph.D. in 2022 from the University of Arizona. She currently teaches history at A-State Campus Queretaro.



Dr. Kellie Wilson-Buford presented "Foolish, Incautious and Possibly Provocative Virgin[s]": Cold War Courts-Martial and the Impossible Burden of Proof Shouldered by Female Victims of US Military Sex Crimes" at the American Society for Legal History in Philadelphia, PA.





Dr. Heather McNamee presented "Seasons of Love" at the National Humanities Conference in Indianapolis, IL. She will also be supervising 11 BSE interns in Spring 2024; the largest cohort in over a decade.

"I had originally planned on going on to law school. I was going to take a gap year working for an attorney.

The day after my graduation my Dad got really sick. It was a long healthcare crisis and I moved back home to help with the cattle ranch.

I did work for a local attorney as his Legal Assistant/Office Manager for a year. Then I went on to work as an Executive Assistant to CEO for a healthcare nonprofit organization. I worked there for about 4 years.

I started as an assistant to a Commercial Lender in Jonesboro and then transitioned to assistant to Market President and a Commercial Lender for our Paragould Market. A couple of years ago, I decided to start my own side business, Sarah's Resume Services & Beyond, providing assistance with resumes and application related documents.

I did not go into a standard typical history related job.

I do feel that having a Bachelor's and college education in general has helped in my career. Having a degree in some ways sometimes helps by just gaining someone's respect.

It shows that you are definitely capable and writing those papers took so much research and skills in general. It's not easy to pass all of those classes. You have to put in the work.

The truth is you can do anything [with a history degree]. If you aren't sure of exactly what you want to do then take some other classes too with your electives."




