II. Research interests:

1. Primary interest Ecclesiastical history, in particular the organizational structure and administration of the English establish church in the Northern Province from the late 17th-century to the last years of Queen Victoria's reign. Currently interests – the Anglican clergy as civil magistrates, 1780-1840 and the involvement of the clergy of the Diocese of Durham in national in addition their traditional involvement in local politics.

3. In attrition, and not related to primary interests - British investment in late 19th-century Arkansas through the creation of a London based company, The Arkansas Cotton and Timber Lands Company. This research has shed light on British investment in North America in general, and in Arkansas in particular. It includes details of American investors failure (in some case refusal) to repay foreign loans, the creation of the London based Council of Foreign Bond Holders for the collection of repudiated debts, and the impact on the state of Arkansas for its failure to meet its international financial obligations.
