Two of our faculty have taken on additional responsibilities on behalf of the college in a parttime capacity.

DR. SCOTT BRUCE, AT, will lead coordinated research efforts in our college as assistant dean of research. Specifically, he will

• Establish a committee of research "point persons" in each department/program to facilitate conversation and research planning on a much larger scale in the college.

 Identify opportunities to engage in interdisciplinary/interprofessional collaboration across research projects.

 Assist faculty with their IRB applications and with their research designs to maximize the possibility of finding significant results, both statistically significant and clinically significant.

· Aid all faculty to be involved in student research leading to poster presentations at their professional organization's meetings, but to also develop that research into manuscripts for publication.

 Ensure all programs/departments are represented at Create@State day.

DR. SHAWN DRAKE, chair of PT, will lead some coordinated faculty development (revolving around teams) in our college as the assistant dean of team-based faculty development. She will:

• Establish teaching teams to work in a mentor/ mentee capacity to implement best teaching/ learning practices.

 Develop resource center through Organization on Basecamp to promote evidence-based teaching/learning models.

· Promote pedagogical research that integrate with classroom activities.

· Assist faculty in the development of their grant writina.

 Promote networks for grant opportunities with researchers at ABI/NYIT/et al.

Looking back to the start of a new decade (which I for one was very excited about), I tried to remember if I had a great January and February 2020 because when we got to March, everything has blended together. As with you, all things are different and days are spent organizing around our best efforts to keep everyone safe while trying to provide quality education to future health care providers in demanding, accredited health professions programs.

Our best news is that all students in the spring and summer graduated on time which was a miracle effort performed by faculty, staff, our collaborating clinical sites as well as students. More good news might be that we had two accreditation site visits before March which was an absolute blessing. ACEN, our nursing accreditor, sent six site visitors who spent time from Monday to Thursday digging into everything that we do. Our Master's in Athletic Training program was also visited. We have already heard that their program has been accredited (it is a new program, so first accreditation). The first class of students graduated in August so that was good news for them. Most accreditors will require follow up

reports on items they desire more info on. We will be doing that for both the nursing and AT accrediting bodies. I am just happy we did not have to suspend or delay either visit.

Despite no physical visits on campus, you will see that we have been able to hire "lots" of new faculty and staff. I am excited about the strengths and expertise they can bring to our college. Who would have thought that we could have such a successful recruitment period with all Zoom interactions. Look for these faculty to do great things.

Work has not stopped on creating brand-new curriculums, revising existing curriculums, fine tuning student learning objectives and thinking of better ways to have students "learn" the material vs. memorization. Braelen Hunt was one of six students selected for Distinguished Service Awards. Barelen is from Bergman, Ark., and graduated magna cum laude with honors in August 2019, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in A-State's coordinated dietetics program in the College of Nursing and Health Professions. She owned a 3.93 overall GPA and 4.0 in the dietetics program. Her minors were disaster preparedness and emergency management and sociology. Following graduation, she took the registered dietician (RD) exam and passed it on her first try.

While in school, Hunt was a member of Phi Kappa Phi honor society, the nation's oldest and most selective multidisciplinary honors fraternity. She was also an A-State Honors College student. Her academic contributions include receiving a 2018 Harry S. Truman scholarship, a national graduate fellowship for students pursuing careers in public service. She also was a semifinalist for the Fulbright U.S. Student Program, received an Arkansas Promise scholarship (2015-19), and Arkansas Lottery scholarship (2015-19). Hunt also became the first Create@State undergraduate research poster winner for the CNHP in spring 2019 by performing research on utilizing nutritional yeast as a source of cyanocobalamin (vitamin B12) in vegan adolescents to prevent megaloblastic anemia, neuropathies and homosysteinemia. During spring 2019, she received valuable experience with supervised practice at St. Bernards Dialysis Outpatient Clinic; bariatric, medical surgery and intensive care unit at Baptist Memorial Hospital; and the Oncology Outpatient Clinic at St. Bernards.

She also served as a freelance photographer providing school portraits for foster children and their parents for ABC Homes Foster Shelter and photos on social media of animals available for adoption at the NEA Humane Society.

Kays Foundation Makes Grant Awards for 2020-2021

The Board of Directors of the Kays Foundation awarded grants to Faculty in CNHP for their projects during the 2020-21 academic year.

Andrea Brown, assistant professor of occupational therapy, wrote a proposal for a \$28,471 grant that will provide equipment and materials to develop an interprofessional pediatric rehabilitation lab. The lab will be shared by programs in occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech-language pathology. The shared space will serve several purposes, including interdisciplinary learning experiences.

A project proposed by **Dr. Susan Hanrahan**, dean, College of Nursing and Health Professions, "21st Century Health Technology – Access/Impact," was funded at \$59,924. The grant will be used to acquire telehealth equipment for educating selected health care providers in the college and region. **Dr. Mark Foster**, chair of graduate nursing programs, will administer the project.

Dr. Alexis Kendrick, assistant professor of physical therapy, received funding for a women's health program, "The Kays Foundation Women's Health and Physical Therapy Residency." Over a four-year period, the grant will provide the Department of Physical Therapy \$200,000 to develop a women's health physical therapy residency to assist the community with women's health issues.

A-STATE / NYIT IPE DAY

The Northeast Arkansas Interprofessional Education Collaborative and Research Network (NEA-IPEC-RN) organized an "Introduction to IPEC" event on campus and was held at First National Bank Arena in January. Students from the following disciplines participated: osteopathic medicine, physical therapy, athletic training, social work, and communication disorders, nutritional science. The primary goal of the event was to introduce the IPEC four core competencies to health professions students: Values/Ethics, Roles/Responsibilities, Interprofessional Communication, and Teams/ Teamwork. Using a real patient scenario, each team discussed the IPEC competencies. Following discussion, a panel of experts and the patient met with the students to discuss patient-centered care and interprofessional collaboration. (see photo on page 7)

BILL PAYNE EXCELLENCE IN LAB SCIENCE SCHOLARSHIP

As a result of a generous gift from Drs. Stephen and Marsha Guffey, a scholarship has been established in the name of William Payne, who retired from the Clinical Laboratory Faculty in 2019 after 30 years of service. Bill was a beloved teacher and scholar among students and faculty. His dear friend and former colleague, Dr. J. Postscript William Carter Payne (1953-2020)

It is with a very sad heart that I want to share that Bill Payne died on July 21, 2020 at the Phil and Flo Jones Hospice House at the age of 66. In our fall 2019 newsletter, you would have read a blurb about his retirement from the university and his 31 years of service to the College of Nursing and Health Professions—specifically in the Clinical Laboratory Science Department. I won't reiterate all of that retirement conversation but do want to share what his colleagues emailed when they heard the news of his passing - valued colleague, good friend, tremendous loss, great person, will miss his smile and kindness, touched the lives of many students, sweet spirit, wonderful person, eager to help everyone in need, awesome man, fine gentleman and truly remarkable person. A-STATE SPEECH AND HEARING CENTER SHIFTS TO VIRTUAL SERVICES

The A-State Speech and Hearing Center was abruptly closed following Spring Break 2020 secondary to COVID-19. CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

There is much work going on in many of the departments in the college. Pam Towery has been contracted to work on developing the graduate degree in nutrition that is being mandated by the accrediting body. The curriculum proposal should go to the Graduate Council in January. Rhonda Holcomb has been working to build out the BS in Health Studies as an online option as well. There are many classes that still need to be developed before the program is ready to go. Dr. Joseph Richmond has worked to take his graduate online DPEM program to Academic Partners (AP), who will work to market this degree nationwide. The programming should begin in January. Dr. Christie Black is working with her accrediting body on gaining approval for the master's program that supports nurse anesthesia to an accreditation mandated DNP. We are hopeful that we will gain approval so that we may implement in 2021. Dr. Mark Foster has launched his online degrees in MSN Nurse Educator and MSN Nurse Administrator. Those will move to AP on line next fall. In addition, the university has mandated that the graduate FNP program move to AP online next fall as well. Dr. Julie King is taking the BS in Occupational and Environmental Safety and Health to the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee this fall. Lark Montgomery will launch the MSN Acute Care Nurse Practitioner degree this fall. The AASN program that we have supported at the Beebe campus will graduate its final class in December.

We continue to develop quality programming that meets the needs our larger health care region and our accrediting bodies. We appreciate the support of our community partners and our advisory boards in this regard.

A-STATE HIPPOTHERAPY PROGRAM

The A-State Hippotherapy Program held their second annual open house on January 29, at the Roy Lee Aldridge Jr. Hippotherapy Center. Hippotherapy is using the movement of the horse in a highly sophisticated treatment strategy to address the patient's needs through occupational therapy, physical therapy, and speech-language pathology. Hippotherapy uses evidence-based practice and clinical reasoning in the purposeful manipulation of equine movement to engage sensory, neuromotor, and cognitive systems to achieve functional outcomes. The Hippotherapy program is an interprofessional experience between the DPT and OTD students. These students learn how to perform treatments and work with the patient and the horse. They are then responsible for performing evaluations and working through integrated plans of care for their patient.

Our open house was an opportunity to welcome other departments in the College of Nursing and Health Professions as well as the community. There were over 80 people in attendance. The purpose was to allow other students, faculty, and community members to be educated on the treatment and observe real treatment sessions.

Kays Foundation Women's Health Physical Therapy Residency

In 2020, the Kays Foundation awarded the Department of Physical Therapy a \$200,000 grant to launch A-State's first Residency Program in Women's Health. The mission statement of the Kays Foundation Women's Health Physical Therapy Residency is to educate physical therapy professionals in Women's Health, enhance quality of life for women across the lifespan, and enrich the lives of all women in the Mississippi Delta region and beyond who encounter Arkansas State Physical Therapy faculty, students and alumni. The residency is coordinated between Arkansas State University and Advanced Physical Therapy (Little Rock) with didactic and clinical components over a 12-month period.

The residency program includes topics such as lymphedema, pelvic floor dysfunction, osteoporosis, pelvic pain, and obstetrics/ gynecological conditions. The residency experience will prepare the resident for the American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties (ABPTS) specialty certification examination to become a Women's Health Clinical Specialist (WCS) in order to promote women's health physical therapy in Arkansas.

Shawn Drake, PT, Ph.D., will serve as the Program Director and Nicole Coleman, PT, DPT, WCS will serve as the Program's Coordinator. Dr. Coleman earned a Doctor of Physical Therapy Degree from the University of Michigan in Flint, Mich., and earned her board certification in Men's and Women's Pelvic Health (WCS) from the ABPTS. She completed the four-course pelvic floor series through Herman and Wallace Pelvic Rehabilitation Institute. Dr. Coleman will direct the didactic portion of the curriculum and ensure that the resident meets all clinical competencies for the residency. Mitzi Gibson, MSPT, will serve as clinical faculty coordinator at Advanced Physical Therapy. Advanced Physical Therapy provides patientcentered, outcome oriented and scientifically based treatment for general orthopedic problems, prenatal postpartum conditions and pelvic floor dysfunctions for men, women, and children of all ages. Advanced Physical Therapy is a leader in pelvic floor rehabilitation in the state of Arkansas.

Applications will be accepted through the Residency and Fellowship Physical Therapy Centralized Application Service (RF-PTCAS) beginning in the next year or two (look for announcements). The resident must be a licensed physical therapist in the state of Arkansas prior to beginning the residency. In addition, the resident must complete Herman & Wallace pelvic health/floor level I continuing education coursework prior to application deadline. Additionally, pelvic floor level 2A and 2B or pelvic health physical therapy level 2 (bowel dysfunction and pelvic pain) must be completed prior to beginning the residency.
