Successful SOC <u>Evaluation Teams</u>	Common Obstacles Faced
attend to Evaluation Requirements while balancing system factors	<ul> <li>There will be paperwork delays.</li> <li>Working within a larger system is often difficult.</li> <li>System changes often impact enrollment and fulfillment of requirements.</li> <li>Changes from initial logic model will occur.</li> </ul>
stay "in the loop" proactively	•Staying in the loop is difficult, especially if the project staff and the evaluation team are not housed within the same building/agency.
attend SOC meetings	<ul> <li>Attending a lot of meetings is time consuming.</li> <li>SOC work is not "business as usual;" evaluation and project staff are not likely to understand how they must work together in order for the project to be successful.</li> </ul>
act as a "critical friend"	<ul> <li>Project staff generally want to hear the "good" news, and not the "bad" news.</li> <li>Program change requires that both the good and bad news are reported.</li> </ul>
interact & partner with families & community	<ul> <li>•Working with input from others is not always easy.</li> <li>•There will likely be many delays in every process.</li> <li>•This is new territory for many, so stakeholder input is limited.</li> <li>•Expect analysis paralysis: no one takes the initiative without consensus.</li> <li>•Consensus is elusive.</li> </ul>
recognize that they are the experts	<ul> <li>Not everyone understands the importance of evaluation.</li> <li>Evaluation is not a "common language," so others need to be trained in evaluation.</li> </ul>

## Lessons Learned & Recommendations for Evaluation Teams

- Work to understand the current system and its history
- Involve Project Staff in evaluation from the beginning ○Likewise, involve Evaluation Staff in the SOC
- Stay in constant contact with Project Staff
- Recognize that this evaluation is different
- Help project stakeholders take ownership of evaluation
- Disseminate data often, in many different formats

- Provide formative feedback to improve SOC as often as possible (empowerment evaluations are important)
- · Be willing to revise evaluation based on community feedback
- Develop solid, trusting relationships with stakeholders
- Be constructive, cooperative partners
- Utilize and promote the evaluation expertise of the team
- Train (and re-train) service providers on the evaluation
